## FORMATION NOTED BY CONSERVATION MAGAZINE

The June, 1958, VIRGINIA WILDLIFE magazine, publication of the state Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries, carried a notice of the organization of this Society. The special article appears on page 20 of the current edition. The objectives of the Virginia Herpetological Society (as carried in Bulletin No. 1, March, 1958)were outlined. Accompanying the write-up was a progress report. The acting secretary is pleased to note additional progress in the first three months of the Society's life. From a "hard core" of thirty members we have now an "interested" following of close to eighty. A few of these are former Virginia residents now living elsewhere. 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# EXCELLENT BIBLIOGRAPHY SUPPLIED ON HERPETOLOGY OF DELMARVA PENINSULA

Dr. Clyde F. Reed is well-known to most of our scientific readers. He is the author of many papers on the herpetofauna of Maryland and Delmarva which, of course, takes in the Virginia Eastern Shore counties of Accomac and Northampton. He has one of the largest collections of specimens from the Delmarva region. The Reed Herpetorium at 10105 Harford Rd., Baltimore34, Maryland, houses some 5,000 specimens. Dr. Reed has been actively collecting in Virginia since 1953. Recent years were devoted to Dismal Swamp and northward to the Northern Neck.

Dr. Reed is the author of an index to both COPEIA (the publication of the American Society of Ichthyologists and Herpetologists) and HERPETOLOGICA (publication of The Herpetologists' League.) We are reminded that the more scholarly work in this field appears in these excellent publications and in the Virginia Journal of Science as in other state journals of science.

Dr. Reed publishes a series known as "Contributions to the Herpetology of Maryland and Delmarva." A set of these on hand in the Society's files is being studied now and as soon as results can be recorded the information relative to Accomac and Northampton counties will be circulated in abbreviated form. The papers will then be put in the Society's reference collection and be available on loan to Faculty members.

#### WORK ON THE TRIASSIC OF VIRGINIA ?

Dr. David H. Dunkle, U.S. National Museum, Washington 25, D.C. would like to hear from those members, faculty, students, or other, who are interested in the fossil reptiles of the Triassic in Virginia. He suggests that much careful work remains to be done in this area and welcomes a note from interested parties. Luncheon with Dr. Dunkle at the National Press Club in Washington turned up some tidy taxonomic tactics. He has the newspaper office in his Northern Neck community save the carcasses of unusual reptiles brought in by the populace. He reports to the news office periodically and makes identifications. (This might be a handy idea for much-desired close co-operation with the sometimes bewildered press taxonomists.)

A WORD OF CAUTION LEST WE CONFINE OURSELVES TO TOO NARROW AN AREA was passed on at the same luncheon. In our quest for new species to add to county checklists let us not neglect the other phases of herpetology: ecology, conservation, the study of life cycles and genetics. Many other collectible data of great scientific interest er c properly within the scope of our first stated society objective: "Scientific study of the state's herpetofauna."
